Another Dance Company

Another Dance Company **Epithet**

Choreographer Laura Aldridge

Free

Based on 'To Kill a Mockingbird' and 'Catcher in the Rye', this short dance piece interprets the reader's experience of each of these classic texts. Discarding the constraints of narrative, the dancers explore the experience of escaping into novels and stories. Using movement drawn from a study of the language, patterns of speech and themes used by authors Harper Lee and JD Salinger, Another Dance Company examines the attraction of becoming immersed in an imagined world, regardless of whether that world is dark and painful or light-hearted and humorous.

The piece is performed by three dancers and lasts for 25 minutes.

Mouth of the Humber

Presented by Jez riley French, this is an audiovisual work which uses field recordings of naturally occurring sound around the Mouth of the Humber. Exploring environmental sounds and the hidden sonic of structures and objects, the piece includes captured images, and examines our experience of the aural and visual landscape.

Throughout his long standing career as an improvising musician, intuitive composer, field recordist and visual artist, Jez riley French has created a body of work that both celebrates and challenges concepts of emotive response (in sound and image), naturally occurring music, hidden sonic architecture and the imposed definitions applied to the creative arts; especially those applied to the terms 'music' and 'sound art'.

He is widely regarded as one of Europe's leading artists working with field recordings and his work exploring audible and inaudible environments has been performed, exhibited and released in many countries including France, Japan, Austria, Germany, USA, Canada, the Czech Republic etc.

Jean 'Binta' Breeze is a writer & performer of international standing. An artist with a strong sense of place - she grew up in rural Jamaica & then lived & worked in Kingston, where she soon established herself as a key writer, performer & recording artist.

Performing her work in Jamaica, she soon linked-up with Linton Kwesi Johnson, who encouraged her to come to Britain. She has since performed her work world-wide - including tours of the UK, the Republic of Ireland, the Caribbean, North & South America, Europe, South East Asia & Africa.

Her work reveals a generous & uncompromising vision - exploring a wide range of personal, social & political issues - with a sublimely-tuned lyrical sensibility. As an actress, dancer, choreographer & theatrical director - Jean brings all of her artistic experience to bear on her work as a poet. She has a striking stage presence - generating all the power & excitement of a full-blown theatrical performance.

Jean's collections to date include On the Edge of an Island, The Arrival of Brighteye, Spring Cleaning, Riddym Ravings and The Fifth Figure. Her recorded works include Tracks, with the Dennis Bovell Dub Band (LKJ Records) and Riding on de Riddym (57 Productions).

Clare Pollard was born in Bolton in 1978. She has published three collections of poetry with Bloodaxe, *The Heavy-Petting Zoo* which she wrote whilst still at school, *Bedtime*, and *Look*, *Clare! Look!* She was a *Poetry Review* New Poet of 1996, won an Eric Gregory Award in 2000, and was named one of The Independent's top 20 writers under 30. She has presented two documentaries for Channel 4, one, *The Sixteenth Summer*, with a verse commentary on the break-ups and piss-ups of Bolton's 16 year olds. Clare has toured the UK and Europe extensively.

She represented the Royal Court at Interplay in Athens, and had her first play *The Weather* (Faber & Faber) presented by the theatre as part of its Young Playwrights' Season. Clare is currently editing children's magazine *Young Writer*, teaching poetry at the City Lit, and working on a documentary about the male muse for Radio 4. Her next play is under commission from The Royal Court.

One of the country's top novelists, Joanne Harris was born in Barnsley in 1964. She studied Modern and Mediaeval Languages at Cambridge and was a teacher for fifteen years, during which time she published three novels; *The Evil Seed* (1989), *Sleep, Pale Sister* (1993) and *Chocolat* (1999), which was made into an Oscar-nominated film starring Juliette Binoche and Johnny Depp. Since then, she has written *Blackberry Wine*, *Five Quarters of the Orange, Coastliners, Holy Fools, Gentlemen and Players* and, most recently, *The Lollipop Shoes.* Her books have won a number of British and international awards. In 2004, Joanne was one of the judges of the Whitbread and in 2005 she was a judge of the Orange prize.

Her hobbies are listed in Who's Who as: "mooching, lounging, strutting, strumming, priest-baiting and quiet subversion of the system", although she also enjoys sleaze, rebellion, witchcraft, armed robbery, and tea and biscuits. She plays bass guitar in a band first formed when she was 16, is currently studying Old Norse and lives about 15 miles from the place she was born. David Atkinson, cultural and historical geographer at the University of Hull, contributes the academic background and theoretical analysis, whilst broadcaster and writer Rupert Greed puts the project into a distinctly local context. Each book contains a CD of the audio which accompanied the walk.

A flyleaf poem is a poem written actually or notionally on the blank page of a particular book. Many poets have written such poems, including Robert Frost, Jorge Louis Borges, and Basil Bunting.

Participants will be asked to choose a book with a particular personal association for them. It could be any book at all: a children's book, school book, novel, travel guide, recipe book etc. Books can be brought on the day, or work can be done from memory, as some treasured books are irretrievable.

Using exercises to build a picture of the relationship to the text, participants will then be invited to write a poem 'on the flyleaf' of the chosen book. The session will end with a reading of some or all of the poems.

Shami Chakrabarti is an outstanding speaker and campaigner for the cause of human rights and civil liberties. She will be outlining her key concerns and inviting questions on a range of topics.

Since becoming Director of Liberty in 2003, Shami has campaigned widely to show that respect for human rights is at the core of democracy, and to warn against its betrayal in times of national crisis. Her outspoken style and commitment to freedom and equality has made her a political icon, and saw her voted second in Channel 4's 2006 poll for the UK's 'most inspiring political figure' and in the top ten of the 'who runs Britain?' poll on the BBC. A Barrister by background, she was called to the Bar in 1994 and worked as a lawyer in the Home Office from 1996 until 2001 for Governments of both persuasions.

She was recently appointed a Governor of the London School of Economics and the British Film Institute and a Master of the Bench of the Honourable Society of the Middle Temple. She is a frequent contributor to radio, television and the press.

However, recent research suggests that even the mysteries of attraction can be revealed, and our questions, including those above, answered, which is great news for those amongst us who would rather not leave seduction to chance.

Frank, witty and packed with invaluable advice, Simply Irresistible is essential for improving your human relationships across the board. Dr Persaud unlocks this fascinating area of human behaviour in an unmissable guide to the mysteries of attraction.

Dr Raj Persaud is a consultant psychiatrist working at the world-famous Maudsley Hospital in south London, and an honorary senior lecturer at the Institute of Psychiatry, University of London. He also holds a first-class honours degree in psychology from University College London, which recently awarded him the title of Fellow in recognition of his ground-breaking work in psychiatry.

Professor Persaud is the author of *Staying Sane*, *From the Edge of the Couch, The Motivated Mind* and *The Mind* and his work has been published in leading academic medical journals. He writes regularly for the national press and hosts BBC Radio 4's *All in the Mind* - the only broadcast series dedicated specifically to reporting on academic psychology and psychiatry. Libraries Connect Communities Online

Libraries Connect Project will develop a website to connect refugees and communities around the world. The website will encourage and focus on creativity, literature, learning and arts. Initially, the website will showcase artwork and text based work done by groups of refugee children in Hull and Ghana, as part of a Wilberforce 2007 project called Libraries Connect Communities. The website will invite and encourage input from refugees around the world, and will link their various websites and blog sites. The website hopes to highlight the creative, and aspiring part of people that is often ignored at the expense of the politics of being a refugee.

The Libraries Connect Project is a Libraries Services initiative that aims to develop and improve access to services for Hull's refugee communities. Intended for those aged between 13 and 30 the project involves events held at libraries, schools and community/support centres, and includes language, arts, information, education and training initiatives.

The Libraries Connect Project is funded by the Paul Hamlyn Foundation.

Creative Freedom; exercises in experimental video

Fragments of collected material from journeys in Ghana, with a particular focus on the legacy of transatlantic slavery. The material includes collections of still and moving images, written text, sound, spoken words, interviews, proverbs, sayings, poems, dance and music.

Arts in Mind: Exploring Slavery

The 'Exploring Slavery' project will be run by the Hull and East Yorkshire Mind 'Arts In Mind' project. Arts In Mind uses the arts to promote good emotional wellbeing, confidence and selfesteem in children and young people aged between 5-13 years. This project will give asylum seeking and refugee children from Endeavour High School the opportunity to create a text based artwork exploring the issues of language and identity and their relationship with slavery. The young people involved will work with a professional poet and sculpture artist to create a textual sculpture piece that will link in with the Wilberforce 2007 celebrations, as well as creating a powerful piece as part of the Humber Mouth Literature Festival.

Four half-day project workshops will take place at Endeavour School during the Humber Mouth Literature Festival period (16th June - 1st July). Two of these workshops will take place in the week beginning 11th June, and two in the week beginning 18th June 2007. The finished text based artwork will be prominently displayed within Endeavour school.
